April Commissioners Meeting: IDEA Remarks

The IDEA commission department met with the IDEA committee chair to share updates on recent activities, cultural observances, and to provide an update on the 44 recommendations submitted by the racial equity task force in 2021. We will continue to work with committee members to schedule the next IDEA meeting in May.

To date, there are 28 of the 44 recommendations that are either complete or in progress. This yields a 63% progress-to-completion rate.

As a breakdown (examples only):

- Items Completed include the extension of the GOS grant to 2 years as voted on by the Grants committee.
- Item In progress actions include:
 Considering a mechanism that provides grant writing support for grant applicants.
 At this time, the Community Outreach team has been working with the Grants
 management department on the GAP (grant assistance program) Initiative, which
 is where current grantees go out into the community and help with grant writing,
 questions, etc.

The IDEA Committee will continue to intentionally work on these items until each item is complete. Ensuring that there is an integration, communication and sustainability plan, creating a more applicable pathway for all DC-based Artists to contribute, be invested in and supported across the DC artistic landscape.

IDEA Attends the National Diversity & Leadership Conference

The IDEA team including two members of the Grants Team managers attended the National Diversity & Leadership Conference in Dallas, Texas from April 15th- 18th for its 20th anniversary program. This conference, hosted by the National Diversity Council, is a National hub for IDEA best practices, connections and though leadership. Conference attendees include leaders and decision-makers from a variety of industries with internationally renowned speakers who brought their unique experiences integrating various diversity and inclusion topics that can be applied to strati development as well as personal and professional life. a full debrief will be scheduled to share key, takeaways, best practices, and next steps in the coming weeks. The team also visited the Dallas culture and arts office interacting with three of its executive members, including its public affairs, officer and two of its deputy executive directors. The team also visited one of the six venues that is owned and managed by the Dallas arts and culture office called the Bath House. There, they were able to meet their program executive Director, and receive a tour of the building, where they host a myriad of events, and have art from DC Artist installed in their building.

The four days were filled with sessions, workshops, and featured speakers that cover a wide range of topics; you can also adapt your experience for optimal learning and we have prioritized sessions that would benefit the agency.

IDEA Key Performance Indicator Initiative

The CAH IDEA department started an initiative to establish keep performance indicators to continue to promote equity in our grant processes. Implementing a standardized data collection methodology for an art agency offers significant benefits and helps establish effective Key Performance Indicators for the Commission with a focus on equity.

This includes dissecting demographic, geographic, and providing evidence-based recommendations that'll counteract any potential patterns of inequitable allocation of resources coming from CAH. The department is working closely with key team members to actualize this initiative and integrated into future iterations of grant application process.

(If needed) Data Analytics

The aggregation of data and further analytics allows us to make evidence-based decisions that create a more equitable allocation of resources and grants across the artistic landscape with consideration of demographics, geography and socio-economic need.

Key Performance Indicators (KPI)

We're recommending a KPI model and structure that will allow the agency to measure and determine metrics. This will allow CAH to track progress for grants awarded using demographic data, that is either, (a) readily available through city census data, or (b) voluntarily provided through an approved data collection methodology. This standardizes data and creates a foundational data set to measure progress, changes, and sustainability of our grant awarding process.
